IN BRIEF

- 104 high-level dignitaries and officials are expected to deliver statements during the four-day High-Level Segment of HRC55, which will take place in a hybrid manner. So far, a total of two heads or deputy heads of State, seven heads or deputy heads of government, and 68 ministers or vice-ministers are scheduled to address the Council. Secretary-General of the United Nations, H.E. Mr António Guterres, as well as the President of the UN General Assembly, H.E. Mr. Dennis Francis (Trinidad and Tobago), will also be delivering an address at the start of the High-Level Segment.
- On 4th March, Mr. Volker Türk, the High Commissioner for Human Rights, will open HRC55 with an oral global update on the human rights situation around the world. This oral update together with other country specific oral updates given by the High Commissioner will provide the basis for the general debate under item 2 on 4th and 5th March.
- During the session, the Council will hold 37 Interactive Dialogues with the High Commissioner, his Office and designated experts (i,e., Special procedures mandateholders, investigative mechanisms, as well as Special Representative of the Secretary General). The Council will also have three enhanced Interactive Dialogues, one high level dialogue, as well as nine General Debates.
- During the session, the Council will consider <u>country-specific reports</u> submitted by the High Commissioner (HC) or the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR), and UN Secretary General (SG) covering human rights issues in, *inter alia*:

- Item 2
 - ° Cyprus.
 - Myanmar.
 - The Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and the obligation to ensure accountability and justice.
 - ° Sudan.
 - Belarus in the run-up to the 2020 presidential election and in its aftermath.
 - Occupied Syrian Golan.
 - Israeli settlements in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and in the occupied Syrian Golan.
- Item 10
 - Technical assistance and capacity-building to improve the situation of human rights in **Haiti** in connection with a request from the authorities of Haiti for coordinated and targeted international action.
 - ° Technical assistance and capacity building for South Sudan.

- The Council will also consider thematic reports submitted by the HC, or the OHCHR, and the UNSG, including inter alia:
 - Item 2
 - Conclusions and recommendations of special procedures (<u>SG report</u>).
 - Activities of the OHCHR offices in Guatemala, Honduras and Colombia (HC reports).
 - Effective implementation of international human rights instruments (SG report).

 - ° Rights of persons with disabilities (<u>OHCHR</u> report).
 - ° Rights of the child (<u>HC report</u>).
 - ° Youth and human rights (OHCHR report).
 - Minority issues (<u>HC report</u>).

- ° Terrorism and human rights (note by the Secretariat on SG's report).
- Human rights and climate change (HC report).

- The Council will hold interactive dialogues (IDs) with human rights special procedures including Special Rapporteurs (SR), Independent Experts (IE), and Working Groups (WG)
 - Thematic mandates:
 - ° SR on human rights and the environment
 - ° SR on unilateral coercive measures
 - SR in the field of cultural rights
 - IE on albinism
 - SR on privacy
 - ° SR on freedom of religion or belief
 - ° SR on counter-terrorism and human rights
 - ° SR on the right to food
 - ° SR on the freedom of peaceful assembly and of association

- ° SR on human rights defenders
- SR on minority issues
- ° SR on torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment
- ° SR on adequate housing
- ° IE on the effects of foreign debt
- SR on the sale, sexual exploitation and sexual abuse of children
- ° SR on the rights of persons with disabilities
- Open-ended Intergovernmental WG on transnational corporations
- IDs with country-specific mandates:
 - ° SR on the situation of human rights in Afghanistan
 - ° SR on the situation of human rights in the Palestinian territory occupied since 1967
 - ° IE on the situation of human rights in Mali
 - ° SR on the situation of human rights in the Democratic People's Republic of Korea

 - ° SR on the situation of h<mark>uman rights in Eritrea</mark>
 - ° SR on the situation of human rights in the Islamic Republic of Iran

- The Council will also hold IDs with Fact Finding Missions (FFMs) on the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela and the Islamic Republic of Iran, the Independent International Commission of Inquiry (IICOI) on the Syrian Arab Republic, the IICOI on Ukraine, UN Commission on Human Rights in South Sudan, and the Group of Human Rights Experts on Nicaragua.
- The Council will also hold IDs with the UN Special Representative of the SG on violence against children and the UN Special Representative of the SG for children and armed conflict.
- In accordance with <u>HRC/PRST/OS/13/1</u> all the Interactive Dialogues will be individual.
- The Council is expected to act on around 32 draft resolutions. The deadline for submitting draft resolutions has been set at 1PM on Thursday, 21st of March.
- Additionally, it is expected to appoint 14 new human rights special procedures, including two members to the Expert Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (one from Africa and one from North America); the IE on the promotion of a democratic and equitable international order; the IE on the situation of human rights in Mali; the SR on the promotion of truth, justice, reparation and guarantees of non-recurrence; the

- SR on the rights to **freedom of peaceful assembly and of association**; five members of the WG on the rights of **peasants** and other people working in rural areas (one each from the African, Asia-Pacific, Eastern European, Latin American and Caribbean States as well as Western European and other Groups); one member of the WG on the use of **mercenaries** as a means of violating human rights and impeding the exercise of the right of peoples to self-determination (from the African Group); the SR on the issue of human rights obligations relating to the enjoyment of a **safe**, **clean**, **healthy and sustainable environment**; and the SR on the promotion and protection of human rights in the context of **climate change**. - The 55th session of the Human Rights Council will adopt, the Universal Periodic Review (UPR) outcome report of 14 States (Azerbaijan, Bangladesh, Burkina Faso, Cabo Verde, Cameroon, Canada, Colombia, Cuba, Djibouti, Germany, Russian Federation, Turkmenistan, Tuvalu, and Uzbekistan).
- Due to a UN holiday on Friday, 29th March and Monday, 1st April, no meetings will be organised nor technical support will be offered during those days.

MODALITIES FOR THE 55[™] SESSION

- The 55th session of the Human Rights Council will take place in Room XX.
- Effective on January 22, 2024, the Department of Conference Management at the United Nations Office at Geneva (UNOG) indicated that it had ceased servicing all hybrid or virtual meetings on any platform, system, or tool (e.g., Zoom, Interprefy, Webex, etc.) as there is currently no General Assembly mandate for the provision of hybrid services.
- This decision to cease services for hybrid and virtual meetings only applies to remote live participation.
 Pre-recorded video statements are still an accepted form of participation, alongside in-person participation.
 UN Web TV will also continue to live-stream the Council's meetings.
- Non-governmental organisations (NGOs) with ECOSOC consultative status and national human rights institutions (NHRIs) with "A" status would have the possibility to deliver their statements in person or via pre-recorded video statements. In order to balance inclusivity and feasibility (in terms of time and resources), the list of speakers for NGOs for each of the General Debates would be set in line with the average number of NGOs that participated in each of the General Debates in the previous three March sessions (i.e., the 52nd, 49th and 46th sessions).


- The online system for inscription by **States** on the list of speakers for all general debates, interactive dialogues and panel discussions will open at **4PM on Monday**, **19th February 2024** and will close 24 hours before the meeting in which each debate is scheduled to start. After the online inscription has closed, delegations may still inscribe or withdraw by sending an email to the address OHCHR-hrclistofspeakers@un.org.
- The online system for the list of speakers for the adoptions of the UPR outcomes will open at 9AM on Monday, 11th March and will close at 6PM on Thursday, 14th March 2024. No registration will be possible after this deadline.
- For NHRIs and NGOs, the list of speakers for all debates for this session will be open online at **2PM on Tuesday**, **20th February 2024**.
- During this session, the list of speakers for each panel discussion will be system-generated based on the priority indicated by the delegation and the time of inscription.
- In accordance with the Institution Building (IB) package, at least one informal open-ended consultation needs to be held on each draft resolution and/or decision before it is considered for action by the Council.

MEASURES TO ASSIST SMALL DELEGATIONS DURING THE HRC

The HRC Helpdesk for SIDS and LDCs is meant to facilitate the understanding of issues raised at the HRC and enhance small State delegates' participation in the session. The use of the online tool e-deleGATE will continue in order to facilitate delegates' work during the HRC. The tool will allow delegates to circulate, table and cosponsor resolutions, amongst others. It is accessible through the following link.^[3]

Delegates will be able to use the Sched meeting application to personalise their agendas and synchronise with their calendars. HRC55 Sched provides details on plenary meetings as well as other meetings scheduled in parallel to the HRC session at the Palais des Nations.



PANEL DEBATES

HRC55 is scheduled to hold **seven panel discussions** on the following subjects:

- Annual high-level panel discussion on human rights mainstreaming on the theme "Harnessing multilateral efforts to embed, amplify and realise the rights of persons with disabilities with a focus on full and effective participation and inclusion in society" (26th February, concept note).
- Panel discussion on countering hatred constituting incitement to discrimination, hostility or violence (8th March, concept note).
- Panel discussion on challenges and good practices to strengthen the fulfilment of the right to social security and for building, financing and implementing public policies and quality public services as key tools for the realisation of economic, social and cultural rights (8th March, concept note).
- Annual interactive debate on the rights of persons with disabilities on the theme "Good practices of support systems enabling community inclusion of persons with disabilities" (11th March, concept note).

- Annual full-day meeting on the rights of the child.
 Two panels (14th March, concept note):
 - Theme 1: Rights of the child and inclusive social protection.
 - Theme 2: Child rights mainstreaming in the United Nations.
- Commemoration of the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (more information will be made available soon).
