

73RD SESSION OF THE UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY (GA73)

Theme

María Fernanda Espinosa Garcés, President of the 73rd session of the UN General Assembly announced that the theme of the general debate is: 'Making the United Nations relevant to all people: global leadership and shared responsibilities for peaceful, equitable and sustainable societies.'

General Debate

The General Debate, during which world leaders will address the GA, took place from 25 September to 1 October. All General Debate speeches are available here.

High-level meetings

- This year's high-level meeting, called the Nelson Mandela Peace Summit, was held on 24 September, (as per GA resolution 72/243).
- A high-level plenary meeting, convened by the President of the GA to commemorate and promote the International Day for the Total Elimination of Nuclear Weapons, was held on 26 September, (resolution 72/251).

- A high-level meeting on the fight against tuberculosis, convened by the President of the GA, was held on 26 September, (resolution 72/268).
- A high-level meeting convened by the President of the GA to undertake a comprehensive review of the prevention and control of non-communicable diseases was held on 27 September, (resolution 72/274).

IN BRIEF: HUMAN RIGHTS COUNCIL (HRC) SESSIONS IN 2018

HRC37

- The 37th regular session of the Human Rights Council (HRC37) was held from 26 February to 23 March 2018.
- The core group of the 'protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms while countering terrorism' resolution, led by Mexico, and the core group of the 'effects of terrorism on the enjoyment of all human rights' resolution, led by Egypt, were able to merge their resolutions into a single text on 'Terrorism and human rights,' which was adopted without a vote.
- During the general debate under item 5, held from 14-15 March, Portugal delivered a statement on behalf of the Group of Friends on national implementation, reporting, and follow-up (NMIRFs), concluding that 'recommendations of the UN human rights mechanisms must be weaved into UN action at all levels, but especially at the level of national planning and delivery through UN country teams.'
- During the session, the Council will consider country-specific reports by the High Commissioner or UN Secretary-General covering human rights

- issues in, *inter alia*. Afghanistan; Cambodia; Colombia; Cyprus; Guatemala; Honduras; the Islamic Republic of Iran; Libya; Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem; Occupied Syrian Golan; and Sri Lanka. The High Commissioner will furthermore deliver oral updates on the situations in Burundi; Democratic People's Republic of Korea; Democratic Republic of Congo; Eritrea; Haiti; Ukraine; and Yemen.
- As with Council sessions in 2017, all this took place against a backdrop of calls for reform of the Council (improved efficiency and effectiveness) and of threats by the US Administration to walk away should the body continue to focus, in an unbalanced manner, on Israel.
- There was considerable opposition to, and much public anguish on the part of Western States and NGOs about, a new resolution presented by China on 'Promoting the international human rights cause through win-win cooperation.' The final adopted text, following informal negotiations and considerable Western 'push back,' represented an important improvement on the original. The contested concept of 'win-win' was replaced by 'mutually-beneficial cooperation' (which was, in turn,

grounded in relevant parts of GA resolution 60/251 such as the call for the Council 'to be guided by the principles of...constructive international dialogue and cooperation,').

- Two resolutions on the relationship between human rights and the SDGs were adopted, one by a cross-regional core group, led by Chile and Denmark, and one by South Africa. In the end, the two resolutions made the same overall point: that States' international human rights obligations and SDG commitments are mutually reinforcing, and that national implementation and reporting should best occur in an integrated manner.
- The 37th session of the Council concluded with the adoption of 42 texts (all resolutions)

HRC38

• The 38th regular session of the Human Rights Council (HRC38) was held from 18 June to 6 July 2018.

- On 19th June, the second day of the Council session, the United States announced its withdrawal from membership of the Council. This is the first time in the Council's history that a State has voluntarily relinquished its seat.
- Following two widely supported joint statements on the issue at HRC36 and HRC37, HRC38 saw Colombia, Norway, Sierra Leone and Switzerland table a resolution on 'the contribution of the Human Rights Council to the prevention of human rights violations.' The simple but important goal of this resolution was to begin an inclusive conversation at the UN on how the Council might better fulfil its prevention mandate, especially under paragraph 5f of GA resolution 60/251, both in its own regard and in combination with the other two pillars of the UN.
- The Council held an interactive dialogue with the Commission of Inquiry on the Syrian Arab Republic (full text here), as well as the Commission of Inquiry on Burundi (full text here).
- The 38th session of the Council concluded with the adoption of 20 texts (all resolutions). This represents a significant decrease year-on-year and

the lowest number of texts adopted by the Council during a June session since 2009.

HRC39

- The 39th regular session of the Human Rights Council (HRC39) was held from 10th to 28th September.
- On September 10th H.E. Ms Michelle Bachelet delivered her first <u>oral update</u> as the new UN High Commissioner for Human Rights. She started her four-year mandate on 1st September 2018.
- The Council held an <u>interactive dialogue</u> with the Independent International Fact Finding Mission on Myanmar, which presented its 440 page <u>report</u> on its 15-month long investigation into the human rights situation in the Rakhine, Kachin, and Shan states of Myanmar
- The Council adopted a resolution by the Lima Group (minus Brazil) on the human rights situation

in Venezuela under item 2, which requests the High Commissioner to present a written report on the situation to the 41st session of the Council.

- The Council also adopted the UN Declaration on the rights of peasants and other people working in rural areas.
- The 39th session of the Council concluded with the adoption of 23 texts (22 resolutions and 1 Presidential Statement).

IN BRIEF: GA73-THIRD COMMITTEE (GA73-3C)

- A dialogue with the new High Commissioner for Human Rights is expected to take place 15 October.
- On 31 October, there will be a dialogue with UNHCR followed by a general discussion.
- The President of the Human Rights Council is expected to present the Report of Human Rights Council on 2 November, and participate in a dialogue, followed by a general discussion.
- The Third Committee will hear presentations from sixty-three (the exact number subject to change) special procedures mandate holders and other experts.
- The US has indicated that its withdrawal from the Human Rights Council will see it play a more active role in the GA's Third Committee and in taking forward human rights issues at the Security Council. Linked with this same point, there are questions over whether the US may try to table resolutions on Human Rights Council reform at this Third Committee session.

- There are also questions over whether shifts in the US position seen at the Council before its departure, for example on gender-related issues, will be reflected in the Third Committee.
- The US may introduce a new resolution on discrimination, particularly anti-Semitism, under item 72 (a).
- With the expected tabling of the biennial resolution on the 'Effects of the terrorism on the enjoyment of human rights,' sponsored by Egypt, Jordan, Morocco, Saudi Arabia, there is the possibility that the text could be merged with the corresponding resolution on 'Protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms while countering terrorism,' sponsored by Mexico. Corresponding texts were combined during HRC37.
- With the 'Moratorium on the use of the death penalty' resolution due to be tabled at GA73-3C, there is an expectation that the Third Committee will see debates over sovereignty, as well as over a blanket prohibition of the death penalty for samesex relations.

- There is expected to be considerable focus on the report of Independent International Fact-Finding Mission on Myanmar, which released an initial report in August 2018, and its full report on 18 September 2018
- It is possible that China will put forward a resolution on 'Mutually beneficial cooperation' (otherwise known as the 'Win-Win' resolution), as it did during HRC37. This resolution looks at links between human rights and development, and the role of international cooperation in that regard.

IN BRIEF: GA73-THIRD COMMITTEE (GA73-3C)

The following draft resolutions are expected to be tabled for adoption at GA37-3C. This prediction is based on the tabling frequency of known resolutions, and issues that are mandated to be considered at GA37-3C through earlier resolutions. There may also be new texts on new issues tabled during the session.

Before adoption, all draft texts would be the subject of negotiations between UN member States. At the end of the Third Committee session, GA members will then move to take action on tabled drafts.
