## IN BRIEF

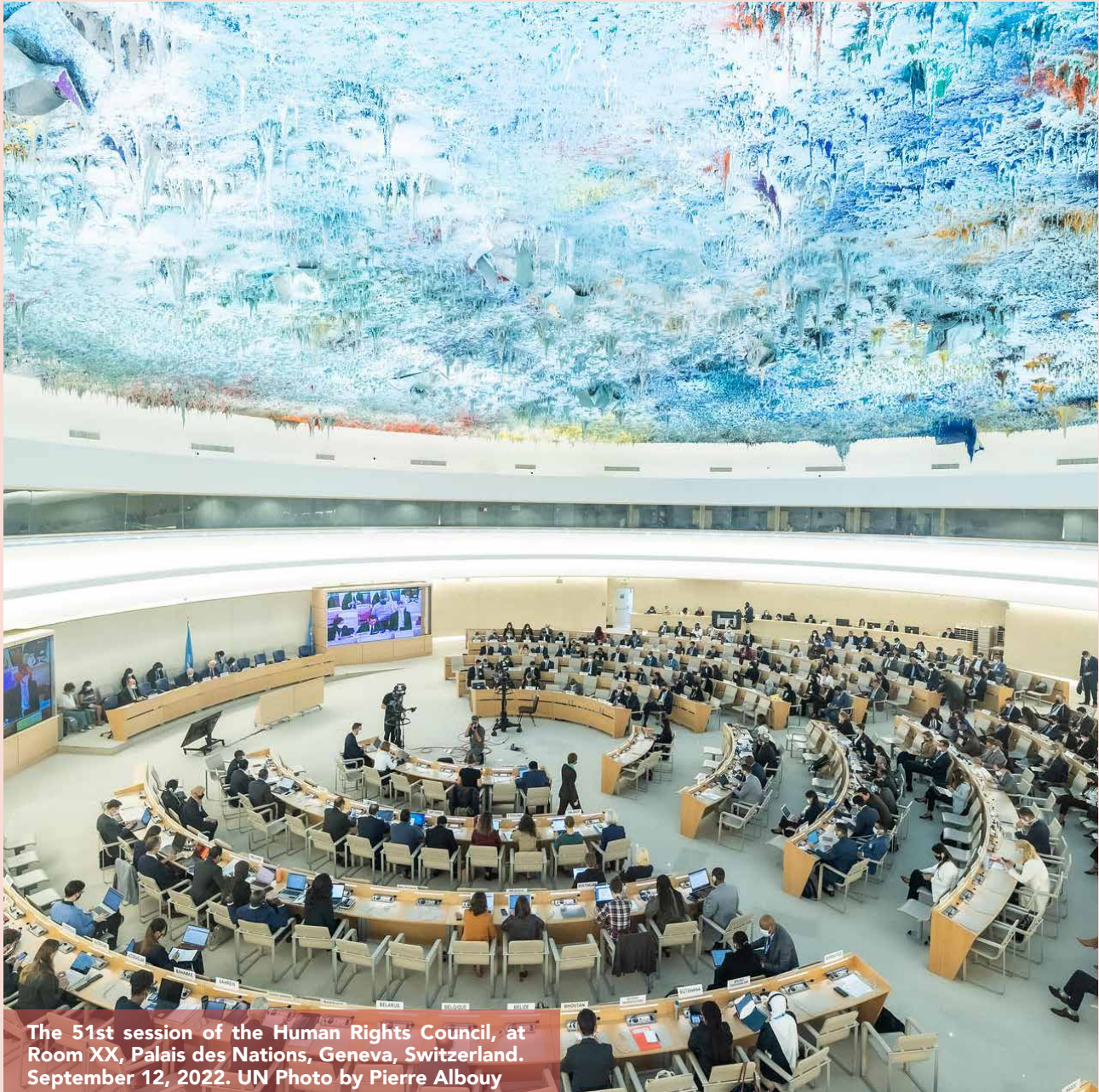
- [130](#) high-level dignitaries and officials are expected to deliver statements during the three-day High-Level Segment of HRC52, which will take place in a hybrid manner. So far, a total of four heads or deputy heads of State, eleven heads or deputy heads of government, and 97 ministers or vice-ministers are scheduled to address the Council. Secretary-General of the United Nations, H.E. Mr António Guterres, as well as the President of the UN General Assembly, H.E. Mr. Csaba Kőrösi, will also be delivering an address at the start of the High-Level Segment.
- On **7th March**, Mr. Volker Türk, the High Commissioner for Human Rights, will open HRC52 with an **oral update on the human rights situation around the world**. This oral update together with other country specific oral updates given by the High Commissioner will provide the basis for the general debate under Item 2 on 7th and 8th March.
- During the session, the Council will **consider country-specific reports** submitted by the High Commissioner covering human rights issues in, *inter alia*:
  - Colombia
  - Guatemala
  - Honduras
  - Myanmar
  - Occupied Syrian Golan
- Additionally, the High Commissioner will also deliver **oral updates** on:
  - Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela
  - Democratic Republic of the Congo
  - Nicaragua
  - Sudan
- The Council will also consider the High Commissioner's and Secretary General's reports on a number of **thematic issues**, including *inter alia*:

- Technical cooperation and capacity-building in promoting and protecting the human rights of persons in vulnerable and marginalised situations in recovery efforts during and after the COVID-19 pandemic
- UN Voluntary Fund for Victims of Torture
- Universal access for all countries to vaccines in response to the COVID-19 pandemic
- The Council will also consider the following High Commissioner's and Secretary General's **country-specific reports**:
  - Accountability in the Democratic People's Republic of Korea
  - Belarus in the run-up to the 2020 presidential election and in its aftermath
  - Human rights in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and the obligation to ensure accountability and justice
  - Israeli settlements in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and in the occupied Syrian Golan
- Root causes of human rights violations and abuses against Rohingya Muslims and other minorities in Myanmar
- The Council will hold **20 interactive dialogues with Special Procedures** (14 thematic and **six** country-specific), including those dealing with: albinism; counter-terrorism; cultural rights; disabilities; environment; food; foreign debt; freedom of religion; housing; human rights defenders; minorities; privacy; sale of children; torture; Afghanistan; Democratic People's Republic of Korea; Eritrea; Islamic Republic of Iran; Mali; and Myanmar.
- In addition, the Council will also hold **eight interactive dialogues with a number of investigative mechanisms**, including the Independent International Fact-Finding Mission on the **Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela**; the International Commission of Human Rights Experts on **Ethiopia**; the International Team of Experts on the **Democratic Republic of the Congo**; the Independent Fact-Finding Mission on **Libya**; the Group of Human Rights Experts on **Nicaragua**; **Commission on Human Rights in South Sudan**; the Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Syrian Arab Republic; and the Independent International Commission of Inquiry on **Ukraine**.
- In accordance with HRC/PRST/OS/13/1, all Interactive Dialogues will be held as standalone engagements.

- The Council is expected to act on around **39 draft resolutions**. The deadline for submitting draft resolutions has been set on the **23th March 2023 at 13:00 CEST**.
- Additionally, it is expected to appoint ten new Special procedures mandate holders, including the Special Rapporteur on the situation of human rights in the Russian Federation, the Special Rapporteur on the right to development, one member to the Working Group of Experts on People of African Descent (from Asia-Pacific States), four members to the Expert Mechanism on the Right to Development (one member from African States, one from Asia-Pacific States, one from Eastern European States and one from Western European and other States), two members to the Expert Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (one from Asia and one from the Arctic), and one member to the Working Group on Enforced or Involuntary Disappearances (one member from Latin American and Caribbean States). - The UPR outcome report of 14 States (Algeria, Bahrain, Brazil, Ecuador, Finland, India, Indonesia, Morocco, Netherlands, Philippines, Poland, South Africa, Tunisia, United Kingdom) will be considered for adoption.

# IMPACT OF THE SPECIAL MEASURES TO COMBAT COVID-19 DURING THE HRC

- Given that there continues to be broad support among delegations and civil society for maintaining hybrid modalities, the Bureau agreed that the 52nd session of the Council should apply hybrid modalities in a similar manner as was done for its 51st session in September 2022.
- Effective 9 January 2023, meeting participants and personnel will no longer be required to wear masks on all UN Geneva premises. The Office encourages everyone to maintain other protective hygiene measures.
- States and NGOs with ECOSOC consultative status should be able to participate in the session either in person from room XX or virtually through Zoom or pre-recorded video messages.
- Delegations will be able to exercise their right of reply remotely in the same manner as during the 51st regular session, by sending a request by email by sending a request to [ohchr-hrclistofspeakers@un.org](mailto:ohchr-hrclistofspeakers@un.org). The Secretariat would register the request and inform the representative of the estimated time for the right of reply segment. The delegation will then be called upon during the right of reply segment, in the order in which requests have been registered.
- Special procedures mandate holders, members of investigative mechanisms and panellists who are unable to travel to Geneva will be able to send pre-recorded video messages for their initial presentations and participate in interactive dialogues or panel discussions via Zoom.
- NGOs with ECOSOC consultative status and active Designations with UNOG will be able to choose their preferred method of participation, either in-person or by a video message, for all debates through the online registration system (<https://ngoreg.ohchr.org>), which opens on 21 February at 14:00 CEST. In order to balance the importance of inclusivity and what is feasible in terms of time and resources, the list of speakers for NGOs for each of the general debates will be set in line with the average number of NGOs that participated in each of the debates in the previous three sessions of the Council in March.
- These modalities do not serve as a precedent for future HRC sessions.
- The online system for inscription by States on the list of speakers for all general debates, interactive dialogues and panel discussions will open on Monday, February the 20th at 16:00 and will close 24 hours before the meeting in which each debate is scheduled to start. After the online inscription has closed, delegations may still inscribe or withdraw by sending an email to the address [OHCHR-hrclistofspeakers@un.org](mailto:OHCHR-hrclistofspeakers@un.org). The online system for inscription on the list of speakers for the adoption of UPR outcomes will open on Monday 13th of March at 9:00 and will close on Thursday 16th March at 18:00. No inscriptions will be possible after this deadline. For national human rights institutions and non-governmental organisations, the list of speakers for all debates taking place during the session will open online on Tuesday 21st February at 14:00.

## MEASURES TO ASSIST SMALL DELEGATIONS DURING THE HRC

The HRC Helpdesk for SIDS and LDCs is meant to facilitate the understanding of issues raised at the HRC and enhance small State delegates' participation in the session. - Biennial high-level panel discussion on the question of the death penalty on the theme, "Human rights violations relating to the use of the death penalty, in particular with respect to limiting the death penalty to the most serious crimes" (28th February, [concept note](#))
- High-level meeting commemorating the thirty-fifth anniversary of the Declaration on the Right to Development (28th February, two accessible meetings, [concept note](#))
- High-level panel discussion on the achievements, good practices and lessons learned by the voluntary funds for the universal periodic review mechanism of the Human Rights Council (1st March, [concept note](#))

- Annual full-day meeting on the rights of the child on the theme “Rights of the child and the digital environment” (8th March, two accessible meetings, [concept note](#))
