CONCISE INFORMATION ON THE UPCOMING SESSION OF THE HUMAN RIGHTS COUNCIL

The Inside Track HRC53: the 53rd regular session of the Human Rights Council

Monday 19th June to Friday 14th July 2023 (4-week session), Room XX, Palais des Nations.







IN BRIEF

- On 19th June, Mr. Volker Türk, the High Commissioner for Human Rights, will open HRC53 with the presentation of his annual report on the human rights situation around the world, followed by an interactive dialogue on his report on State response to pandemics. The presentation of his annual report will provide the basis for an interactive dialogue with the High Commissioner on 20th and 21st June.
- During the session, the Council will consider country-specific reports by the High Commissioner and the Secretary-General covering human rights issues in, inter alia: Iran (Islamic Republic of), Myanmar, Sudan, Ukraine (in the temporarily occupied Autonomous Republic of Crimea and the city of Sevastopol), and Venezuela (Bolivarian Republic of). Additionally, the High Commissioner will deliver oral updates on the follow-up to the resolution Cooperation with Georgia; on the promotion and protection of human rights in Nicaragua; and on the findings of the periodic report of OHCHR on the situation of human rights in Ukraine.
- Other oral updates on country situations by Special Procedures mandate holders will focus on the situation of human rights in Burundi, the Central African Republic, and Myanmar.
- It will also consider High Commissioner's and Secretary-General's reports on a number of thematic issues, including inter alia:
 - Adverse impact of climate change on the full realisation of the right to food;
 - Impact of casualty recording on the promotion and protection of human rights;
 - Impact of technological advances on prevention of genocide efforts and on the risks of the perpetration of genocide;
 - Impact of the civilian acquisition, possession and use of firearms



- Implementation and enhancement of international cooperation in the field of human rights; and
- The way forward to improve technical cooperation and capacity-building in the field of human rights.
- The Council will consider reports from and hold interactive dialogues with 22 Special Procedures (four country-specific and 18 thematic), including those dealing with: Afghanistan; Belarus; Eritrea; the Occupied Palestinian Territory; climate change; discrimination against women and girls; education; extreme poverty; freedom of opinion and expression; independence of judges and lawyers; internally displaced persons; international solidarity; migrants; freedoms of peaceful assembly and association; persons with leprosy; racism; right to health; sexual orientation and gender identity; extrajudicial, summary or arbitrary executions; trafficking; transnational corporations (two reports); and violence against women and girls.
- In addition, the Council will also hold interactive dialogues with three investigative mechanisms: the Fact-Finding Mission on Iran (Islamic Republic of); the Commission on Inquiry on the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem and in Israel; and the Commission of Inquiry on the Syrian Arab Republic.

- As per PRST OS/16/1, there will be no general debates during HRC53. Therefore, the reports and oral updates of the High Commissioner and the Secretary-General as well as subsidiary bodies to be presented during HRC53 will be considered during the relevant general debate at HRC54, unless they are mandated to be considered in the context of an interactive dialogue.
- The Council is expected to act on around 27 draft resolutions and other texts. The deadline for submitting draft resolutions has been set at 1 PM on 5th July 2023.
- Additionally, it is expected to appoint **four** new mandate-holders, including the Independent Expert on human rights and international solidarity; Special Rapporteur on the human rights of migrants; Special Rapporteur on minority issues; and Special Rapporteur on the promotion and protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms while countering terrorism. IMPACT OF THE SPECIAL MEASURES TO COMBAT COVID-19 DURING THE HRC

- The 53rd session of the Human Rights Council will take place in Room XX, which since session HRC50 can be used at full capacity.
- Following the Council President's meetings in New York and the UN Secretary General's agreement with maintaining hybrid modalities the 53rd and 54th sessions, the Bureau agreed that the modalities for the 53rd session should be the same as during the 52nd session to ensure inclusivity. The Bureau noted that UNOG continues to operate under business continuity, and that there was broad support among delegations and civil society for maintaining hybrid modalities. States will be able to participate either in person or virtually through Zoom or pre-recorded video messages, throughout the 53rd Session.
- NGOs in consultative status with ECOSOC and NHRIs with "A" status would have the possibility to deliver their statements in person or via pre-recorded video statements.

- NGOs wishing to participate in the session are invited to register and to indicate their method of participation (in-person or via video statement) through the online registration system (https://ngoreg.ohchr.org), which opens on Tuesday, 13 June at 2 p.m. The method of participation can be amended at a later stage for interactive dialogues, panel discussions and adoption of UPR outcomes.
- The deadline to upload a video statement or to confirm the speaking slot in case of an in-person intervention is at 6 p.m. on the working day before the debate is scheduled to start).
- Due to a UN holiday on Thursday, 29th June, no meetings will be organised nor technical support will be offered during that day.
- In accordance with the IB package, at least one informal open-ended consultation needs to be held on each draft resolution and/or decision before it is considered for action by the Council.

- The main sponsors of draft resolutions are invited to organise informal meetings virtually or in person in Room XXI. Delegations can write to the relevant focal point of the Council Secretariat (mkumar@ohchr.org) for assistance to set up virtual participation in the informal rooms via the platform WebEx. If informal consultations are organised virtually, Core Groups should notify the HRC Secretariat in order for the meeting to be included in the online application 'Sched'.
- The Secretariat has implemented a feature that allows NGOs to co-sponsor other NGOs' statements directly through the online registration system (https://ngoreg.ohchr.org). The previous method, i.e. sending the cosponsorship form via email, will no longer be accepted. Only NGOs with the ECOSOC status and a valid annual designation with the United Nations Office at Geneva can sponsor a statement made by other NGOs.
- As implemented at the 51st and 52nd sessions of the Human Rights Council, the Secretariat intends to

- allocate some space for side events at a reduced level compared to the pre-COVID-19 period due to the ongoing renovations under the Strategic Heritage Plan and their impact on the availability of meeting rooms at Palais des Nations. Hence only a reduced number of side events may be organised and a maximum of one side event per NGO may be requested. Please note that deadline to request an NGO parallel event has passed.
- Each side event will last a maximum of one hour. The same requirements and practices as in the pre-COVID-19 period will apply. The calendar of NGO side events will be made available on HRC Extranet and in the Sched application. NGOs are requested to inform the Civil Society Team about cancelations or any other modifications in their side events at the latest 72 hours before the announced time of their events.
- Since Monday May 22, 2023, all Pass services & identification badges are provided from Pavillon Pregny and no longer at Villa les Feuillantines.

MEASURES TO ASSIST SMALL DELEGATIONS DURING THE HRC

PANEL DISCUSSIONS

The HRC Helpdesk for SIDS and LDCs is meant to virtually facilitate the understanding of issues raised at the HRC and enhance small State delegates' participation in the session. The Secretariat of the LDCs/SIDS Trust Fund is also available for virtual consultations upon request.

The use of the online tool, E-Delegate, will continue in order to facilitate delegates' work during the HRC. The tool will allow delegates to circulate, table, and co-sponsor resolutions, amongst others. It is accessible through the following link³.

Delegates will be able to continue using the Sched app to personalize their agendas and synchronize with their calendars. Sched provides details on plenary meetings as well as other meetings scheduled in parallel to the HRC session at the Palais des Nations. Please note that meeting details may be subject to change and will be updated daily.

HRC53 is scheduled to hold 5 panel debates on the following subjects:

- Panel discussion on the measures necessary to find durable solutions to the Rohingya crisis and to end all forms of human rights violations and abuses against Rohingya Muslims and other minorities in Myanmar (21st June)
- Annual full-day discussion on the human rights of women (30th June)
 - Panel 1: Gender-based violence against women and girls in public and political life
 - Panel 2: <u>Social protection: women's participation and leadership</u>
- Annual panel discussion on the adverse impacts of climate change on human rights. Theme: Adverse impact of climate change on the full realization of the right to food (3rd July)
- Panel discussion on the role of digital, media and information literacy in the promotion and enjoyment of the right to freedom of opinion and expression (3rd July)

WHAT'S IN PRINT?

'L NUMBER' - DRAFT RESOLUTIONS AND OTHER TEXTS AT HRC52°

During HRC53, States will consider **48** reports from the Secretary-General, High Commissioner and his Office, Working Groups and/or the Special Procedures mandate-holders.

These UN reports, which were commissioned by the Council through earlier resolutions, when published, will be made available here⁵.

Based on announcements made during the HRC53 organisational meeting, the voluntary calendar of regular initiatives, and on recurring initiatives from one year previously (HRC50), the following draft resolutions and other texts are expected to be tabled during HRC53. Before adoption, these texts would be subject to at least one round of open informal consultations with interested delegations.



Additionally, the Council will adopt thirteen outcomes reports of the UPR review at its plenary session.

When tabled before the Council, draft resolutions (and other texts) are given an 'L number.'
