The Inside Track HRC54: the 54th regular session of the Human Rights Council

Monday, 11 September to Friday, 13 October 2023 (5-week session), Room XX, Palais des Nations.







#### IN BRIEF


- HRC54 will last five weeks, which means that it will be the longest September session in the Council's history. This is due to the absence of scheduled lunchtime sessions, but also due to the increased number of initiatives, such as interactive dialogues and panel debates.
- On 11th September, Mr. Volker Türk, High Commissioner for Human Rights, will open HRC54 with an oral update on the human rights situation around the world. This oral update together with other country specific oral updates given by the High Commissioner will provide the basis for the general debate under Item 2 on 12th and 13th September.
- During the session, the Council will consider **country-specific reports** submitted by the High Commissioner and the Secretary-General covering human rights issues in, inter alia: **Cambodia, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Georgia, Haiti, Myanmar, Nicaragua,** and **Yemen.** Additionally, the High Commissioner will also deliver an **oral update** on **Belarus, Ukraine,** and **Sudan.**
- The Council will also consider the High Commissioner's and Secretary General's reports on thematic issues, including inter alia:
  - Good practices and challenges in the application of a human rights-based approach to the elimination of preventable maternal mortality and morbidity
  - The **rights of the child** and inclusive social protection
  - Rights of Indigenous Peoples

- Regional seminars on the contribution of development to the enjoyment of all human rights
- Promotion and protection of the human rights and fundamental freedoms of Africans and of people of African descent against excessive use of force and other human rights violations by law enforcement officers through transformative change for racial justice and equality
- Question of the death penalty
- Right to development
- Cooperation with the United Nations, its representatives and mechanisms in the field of human rights
- Human rights of migrants
- The Council will hold the following interactive dialogues. In accordance with <a href="https://example.com/hRC/PRST/OS/13/1">https://example.com/hRC/PRST/OS/13/1</a> all the Interactive Dialogues will be individual.:
  - 20 interactive dialogues with Special Procedures mandate holders (14 thematic and six country-specific) including those dealing with: arbitrary detention; enforced disappearances; hazardous substances and wastes; international order; mercenaries; older persons; people of African Descent (two interactive dialogues); right to development; rights of Indigenous Peoples; slavery; truth, justice and reparation; unilateral coercive measures; water and sanitation; Afghanistan; Burundi; Cambodia; Central African Republic; Russian Federation; and Somalia.

- Five interactive dialogues with investigative mechanisms, including the team of international experts on the Democratic Republic of the Congo; the International Commission of Human Rights Experts on Ethiopia; the Independent Investigative Mechanism for Myanmar; the Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Syrian Arab Republic; and the Independent International Fact-Finding Mission on the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela.
- Ten interactive dialogues with the High Commissioner or his Office on human rights in Belarus; economic, social and cultural rights and COVID-19 recovery; technical assistance and capacity-building to improve the human rights situation in Haiti; the situation of human rights in Myanmar; promotion and protection of human rights in Nicaragua; religious hatred; technical assistance and capacity-building for South Sudan; promoting reconciliation, accountability and human rights in Sri Lanka; situation of human rights in the Sudan; and cooperation with and assistance to Ukraine in the field of human rights.
- Two enhanced interactive dialogues with the High Commissioner and the International Independent Expert Mechanism to Advance Racial Justice and Equality in Law Enforcement, and on the report of the High Commissioner and experts on the Democratic Republic of Congo.
- One interactive dialogue with the Advisory Committee.

- One interactive dialogue with the Assistant Secretary-General for Human Rights.
- The Council is expected to act on around 30 draft resolutions. The deadline for submitting draft resolutions has been set at 1 PM on 4th October 2023.
- Additionally, the Council is expected to appoint twelve new mandate-holders to Special Procedures, including the Special Rapporteurs on minority issues, the human rights of migrants, the promotion and protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms while countering terrorism, the elimination of discrimination against persons affected by leprosy, the rights of persons with disabilities, human rights and international solidarity, protection against violence and discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity, three members of the Working Group on discrimination against women and girls (one from the African Group, one from the Asia-Pacific Group, one from the Eastern European Group, and one from the Western European and other States Group), and a member of the Working Group on the use of mercenaries (from the Eastern European Group). - The Council will elect seven members of the Advisory Committee at the 54th session (two from the African States, two from the Asia-Pacific States, one from the Eastern European States, one from the Latin American and Caribbean States, and one from the Western European and other States).

## MODALITIES FOR THE 54TH SESSION

- The 54th session of the Human Rights Council will take place in Room XX.
- On July 18 2023, the Bureau discussed the organisation of the 53rd session, including extraordinary modalities. Recalling the UN Secretary-General's agreement to maintain hybrid modalities also for the 54th session, the Bureau agreed that the 54th session of the Council should apply hybrid modalities in a similar manner as was done for its 53rd session.
- Throughout the 54th session, state delegations would have the possibility to deliver their statements in person, via pre-recorded video statements, or the Zoom platform.
- Delegations participating remotely would be able to raise a point of order through the "raise hand feature" in the Zoom platform.
- Special procedures mandate holders, members of investigative mechanisms, and panellists who are unable to travel to Geneva would be able to send prerecorded video messages for their initial presentations and participate in the interactive dialogue or panel discussion via Zoom.
- Non-governmental organisations (NGOs) with ECOSOC consultative status and national human rights institutions (NHRIs) with "A" status would have the possibility to deliver their statements in person or via pre-recorded video statements. In order to balance inclusivity and feasibility (in terms of time and resources), the list of speakers for NGOs for each of the General Debates would be set in line with the average number of NGOs

- that participated in each of the General Debates in the previous three September sessions (i.e., the 51st, 48th and 45th sessions of the Council)
- The online system for inscription by States on the list of speakers for all general debates, interactive dialogues and panel discussions will open at 4PM on Tuesday, 5th September 2023 and will close 24 hours before the meeting in which each debate is scheduled to start. After the online inscription has closed, delegations may still inscribe or withdraw by sending an email to the address OHCHR-hrclistofspeakers@un.org.
- The online system for the list of speakers for the adoptions of the UPR outcomes will open at **9AM** on **Monday, 18th September** and will close at **6PM** on Thursday, 21st September 2023. No registration will be possible after this deadline.
- For **NHRIs** and **NGOs**, the list of speakers for all debates for this session will be open online at **2PM** on Tuesday, 5th September 2023.
- During this session, the list of speakers for each panel discussion will be system-generated based on the priority indicated by the delegation and the time of inscription.
- In accordance with the Institution Building (IB) package, at least one informal open-ended consultation needs to be held on each draft resolution and/or decision before it is considered for action by the Council.

# MEASURES TO ASSIST SMALL DELEGATIONS DURING THE HRC

The HRC Helpdesk for SIDS and LDCs is meant to virtually facilitate the understanding of issues raised at the HRC and enhance small State delegates' participation in the session. The use of the online tool, E-Delegate, will allow delegates to circulate, table, and co-sponsor resolutions, amongst others. It is accessible through the following <u>link</u>.

Delegates will be able to continue using the Sched app to personalise their agendas and synchronize with their calendars. Sched provides details on plenary meetings as well as other meetings scheduled in parallel to the HRC session at the Palais des Nations. Please note that meeting details may be subject to change and will be updated daily. The links for virtual participation will be circulated separately by the Secretariat (plenary sessions) or Core Groups (informal consultations for resolutions).

#### PANEL DISCUSSIONS

HRC54 is scheduled to hold **five** panel discussions on the following subjects:

- Biennial panel discussion on unilateral coercive measures and human rights, on the theme 'the impact of unilateral coercive measures and overcompliance on the right to development and the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals' (14th September 2023 – concept note).
- Annual discussion on the integration of a gender perspective throughout the work of the Human Rights Council and that of its mechanisms, on the theme 'revisiting gender parity and its contributions to the integration of gender into the work of international human rights bodies, including the Human Rights Council and its mechanisms' (25th September 2023 concept note).
- 3. Biennial panel discussion on **youth** and human rights, on the theme 'young people's engagement with climate change and global environmental decision-making processes' (26th September 2023 concept note).
- 4. Panel discussion on **cyberbullying** against children (27th September 2023 <u>concept note</u>).
- Annual half-day panel discussion on the rights of Indigenous Peoples, on the theme 'the impact of certain development projects on the rights of Indigenous Peoples, in particular the impact on Indigenous women' (27th September 2023 – concept note).

#### WHAT'S IN PRINT?

During HRC54, States will consider **87** reports from the Secretary-General, the High Commissioner, Special Procedures mandate-holders, and Subsidiary Bodies.

These UN reports, which were commissioned by the Council through earlier resolutions, when published, will be made available here.


